Discovering Relationships

One lesson I have discovered as part of my FrancisCorps experience is that serving the poor starts with hands-on work. At Syracuse's Northside CYO, where I run an after school program for refugee youth and coach a boy's soccer team, the bulk of my day is spent planning and carrying out activities with the kids, organizing field trips, and encouraging my boys and girls to finish their homework during tutoring time. The significance of my hands-on work is that it allows me to form personal relationships with the refugee youth of Syracuse's north side. As members of FrancisCorps, in both Syracuse and Costa Rica, we run programs for disadvantaged

youth, hand out sandwiches to the hungry, change diapers, tutor blind and deaf children, transport clients to and from appointments, and perform other simple actions that require us to be physically present with the vulnerable. In the process, we may not be removing the social structures that cause poverty, but we are forming personal relationships with those who experience it. These relationships ignite in us a conviction that their struggle is our struggle, and I believe that this realization will be what sustains a lifelong passion for promoting social justice in our communities.

Discovering Community

The dining room table is by far the most significant piece of furniture in our house. It's a place for us to gather multiple times a day. It's where culinary clubs are formed during dinner, and where there's no shame in taking seconds...or Lord help us- thirds. It's where we joke, laugh and invent nonsensical and slightly ridiculous nicknames for each other. It's a judgment free zone, where we can share everything, and I do mean everything: from our successes and failings at work, to our thoughts on society, love and religion, to some things which a more polite society may deem less than appropriate for dinner conversation. It's where we leave our mail, our notes to each other, and the ever-essential grocery list. It's where we work on recipes, arts and crafts, and medical school applications. Sometimes it's where we sit and reflect during a quiet Sunday morning breakfast. Our dining room table is a staple in the FrancisCorps community; it is emblematic, at least to me, of what true community living is like. Our table sees everything: our ups and downs, our moments of vulnerability and our mock fights, our love for food and our love for each other. At our dining room table, a community became a family.

For many people, the idea of living in community sounds utterly daunting. I'll be the first to tell you that I was slightly apprehensive of the idea of moving in with five complete strangers. But, very quickly, I came to realize that we weren't really strangers. Sure, we were different, in some cases very different (i.e. Long Islanders), but inherently we all shared similar values, beliefs and mentalities that brought us to the FC dining room table. Whether it was our desire to serve, to augment our prayer life, to challenge ourselves in new and different ways, or just our love and obsession with Brother Jim, we were all able to share and bond with each other those first few days. And our humble little table saw it all. The unique thing was that we six of 'Cuse didn't just bond with each other, but we bonded with our five Costa Rican compatriots too. Though we may be two separate communities, we belong to the same family, and I consider them an integral part of our community. Our table witnessed this bond between communities flourish as well. Whether it was via ridiculous YouTube videos or thoughtful one-on-one time flipping through photos of years past, our table saw the bond of community cemented between eleven perfect strangers embarking on an adventure together, though we were not always going to remain physically together.

Community living is not always going to be sunny and idyllic. As with everything, you will struggle- with people's varying opinions, people's sass, and people's penchant for singing *The Sound of Music* in the shower. These may vex you at times, but you must remember that it's worth it because by the end of the year, you will successfully have another family to call your own. Living in community is ultimately what you make of it. I wanted my community to be like a second family, and lo and behold, that exactly how it panned out (Praise God!). At the end of the day, you bring yourself with you wherever you go. So bring yourself to community and it will flourish. And if you're looking for the perfect place to really bring yourself to community, may I suggest the dining room table? After all, nothing will bond you faster than a good meal, some humor and a smile.

There is not a day that goes by that I cannot wait to wake up and start the day because of the experiences I know are waiting in front of me. Some things do not always go as planned but there are others that do. By living in community, daily prayer and reflection, and the amazing learning experiences I am having, always put me at ease. The lifestyle of a FrancisCorps volunteer has been tremendously rewarding. I have learned and grown so much in these two months and right now I can only imagine what is about to come! **PURA VIDA!**

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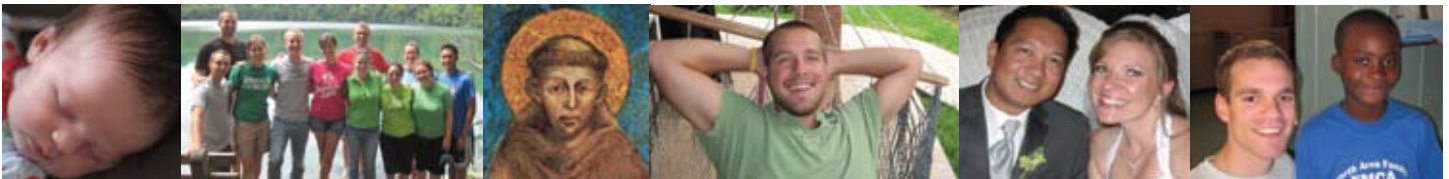
